Spring Has Sprung



Mud Castles

Plan this activity for after a rainy day, or plan to make mud by mixing water and dirt while playing outside. Gather sand buckets, pails, or similar containers and small shovels and spoons. Invite your child to spend some time exploring the mud. How does it feel? Is it cold? Is it soft? Bring out the containers and tools to start building. Invite your child to pile up containers of mud to create a castle. What other ideas can they come up with?

Paper Airplanes

Gather sheets of paper for you and your child. Model how to make a paper airplane, and have your child copy the steps. Begin by folding a sheet of paper in half vertically. Unfold the paper and fold the top corners toward the crease. Fold each of the triangular flaps toward the middle to sharpen the point. Re-fold the paper along the vertical crease made in the first step. Make wings by folding down the edges on each side. Throw the planes outside to test how far they can fly.
