Recipe

Smashed Avocado Toast

ripe avocado bread salt pepper lemon (optional)

Have your children wash their hands so that they can help you make this simple snack. Use a knife to cut open the avocado, remove the pit, and scoop



the flesh into a bowl (adult only). Offer your child a fork, and guide them to use the fork to mash the avocado.

Toast the bread, cut it into smaller triangles, and set out the slices. Help your child spread the smashed avocado onto the slices. Work together to add a sprinkling of salt and pepper. Add a squeeze of fresh lemon juice if desired.
