Wonderful Me



Where We Live



Learn with Me!

• Reading a Book Together

Take this activity outside for a cozy fall reading experience. Begin by gathering a few books, a blanket, and a favorite snack. Invite your child to choose the first book to read. As you read, use the illustrations to talk about characteristics, emotions, or any other traits that make each character in the story unique. At the end of the reading, ask your child to recall important events or share a favorite part.

• Building a Home

Gather building materials and tools, such as blocks, cardboard pieces, cardboard tubes, heavy tape, scissors, paper clips, and a stapler. Invite your child to explore the shapes, sizes, and purpose of the materials. Work together to construct a building that could serve as a pretend home. Engage in conversation with your child as you work. Consider asking questions such as, "How big should the home be?," "How many windows would you like the house to have?," or "What tools do you think we would need to cut the door space?"

Recipe

Apple Crisp

- 4 cups sliced apples
- 1 tsp. cinnamon
- ¼ tsp. nutmeg
- ½ cup water
- ¾ cup sugar
- ½ cup flour
- ½ cup rolled oats
- 1 stick of butter



Place apple slices in a buttered deep dish pie plate. Sprinkle cinnamon and nutmeg over apples and add water. In a separate bowl, mix sugar, flour, rolled oats, and butter until the mixture is crumbly. Sprinkle over apples. Bake at 350°F until apples are tender, about 35–45 minutes.
